## Health Guarantee:

Food: Puppies are fed their mothers milk, Canadian Naturals puppy kibble and freshwater. We use puppy replacement milk and pumpkin puree as they transition from mom to dry kibble.

1. All puppies sold by Rolling Hills Doodles have received a health screening by a licensed veterinarian and are cleared of any disease, and have received their first vaccines, unless otherwise stated. Puppies have been dewormed at 2,5, and 8 weeks old. We do not cover any medical, dental or vet bills once you take the puppy home. There are no returns once you take the puppy home. If unexpected life circumstances require the action of rehoming we will provide support in finding your dog a new home but will not receive them back.

## Health Guarantee:

1. All of our breeding dogs have been tested for specific genetic traits and are clear of any genetic disease that may be passed down to your puppy. We do not breed dogs that carry known genetic disorders or diseases.

2. If your puppy develops a fatal disease that has been diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian, and passes away or must be put down before their first birthday, we will provide you with another puppy from a following litter at no charge.

3. In order for this guarantee to remain valid, your puppy must have regular vet visits and receive all vaccines and care the vet recommends, they must be fed a diet that would be recommended by a certified vet, must receive adequate attention, exercise and rest, and not be abused or neglected in any way.

4. Your puppy must see their new vet within 72 hrs of coming to your home to activate this guarantee.

Not covered by the Health Guarantee:

1. The puppy dies suddenly of unknown causes. (There have been recent cases of puppies getting into drugs at parks and passing away or becoming very sick and although this is sad, no refunds can be issued if accidental poisoning or obstruction from swallowing objects is the reason for the pups passing.)

2. There are <u>no refunds or returns</u> for any dogs, including those that develop treatable disease (such as allergies), or incur accidental or surgical errors resulting in injury or death.
